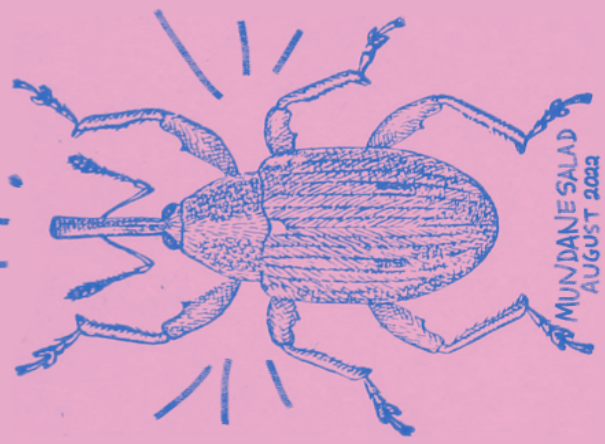


We all know about insects, but do you know about the plethora of ILLEGAL INSECTS that they DON'T want you to know about?

KISSING COCKROACH

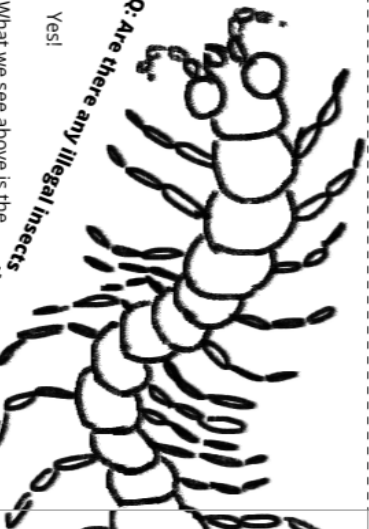
(Gromphadorhina Smooch)

Normally docile and affectionate, this delightful insect is currently barred from nearly all public spaces due to the COVID-19 pandemic and its insistence in coating everything in saliva.



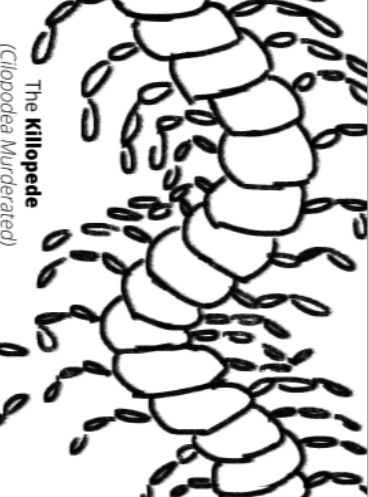
Q: Are there any illegal insects?
